NEW MOBILE PHONE POLICY – FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS FOR FAMILIES

Who does the new mobile phone policy apply to?

The new policy will apply to all Victorian government school students.

When will the new policy take effect?

Schools will be required to implement the new policy from Term 1, 2020.

Can students still bring a mobile phone to school?

Students can bring a mobile phone to school, but it must be turned off and stored securely during the school day. Parents can still contact their children through the school's administration office in emergencies.

Who is responsible for my child's mobile phone when at school?

Mobile phones brought to school are not covered by the school's insurance if they are lost, stolen or damaged.

For more information, please see the Department's Personal Goods policy.

Why is this new policy important and what is the evidence-base for it?

This policy will help focus students' attention on learning in the classroom by providing them with:

- a safe environment to learn without distractions or inappropriate phone use (including cyberbullying)
- greater opportunity for social interaction and physical activity during recess and lunchtimes.

Will there be exceptions for use?

The new mobile phone policy allows for a small number of exceptions. For example, where the mobile phone is used to manage a health condition, .

Phones are part of every young person's life these days so why the change in policy?

Technology is important, but there needs to be a balance between the benefits and risks. The Victorian Curriculum recognises this, and is rich in digital learning opportunities to assist students to develop digital literacy skills at school. Where there is a genuine educational need to have mobile phones in the classroom, teachers can instruct their students to bring their phones to class.

SCHOOLS

How do I contact my child in an emergency?

In emergencies, parents can still contact their children through their school's administration office.

What will be the consequences for students caught with a mobile phone during school time?

Students who use their mobile phone at school will be treated in a manner consistent with their school's existing disciplinary policies.

Does the new policy include other mobile devices, e.g. smart watches?

The new policy does not currently apply to wearables e.g. smart watches and/or iPads. All notifications on such devices must be switched off.

What is my role as a parent or carer?

Parents and carers are encouraged to support their children to become safe and responsible technology users.

What advice is available to families when it comes to managing screen time and in supporting safe online behaviours?

The eSafety Commissioner provides a number of resources for families:

- 7 Tips for Managing Screen Time Provides tips and advice on what families can do to help their child(ren) balance their time on and offline
- Online Safety: A guide for parents and carers Guide offering practical skills and advice about how to tackle the big issues associated with online activity
- Screen Smart Parent Tour Explores topics such as social media, screen time, protecting
 personal information, cyberbullying, contact with strangers and accessing inappropriate
 content.

MOBILE PHONES

From the start of the first term in 2020, mobile phones are banned in Victorian state schools. James Merlino, the Education Minister, has stated that from the first bell of the school day until the end of the school day mobile phones must be kept in lockers and not to be used in the yard or classes. The aim behind the ban on mobile phone for students in schools is to curb the distraction caused by the phones as well as cyberbullying.





STUDENT LAPTOPS

A reminder that students are expected to have a laptop and that students need to bring their laptop to all classes. There has been a significant increase in the number of Year 8 students who are not bringing their laptop to class. This makes it difficult for the teachers, who have planned work, for students to complete, using their laptop. When students forget to bring their laptops to school, they miss valuable class time by going to the library to borrow a laptop. If parents and guardians could support the school by checking that their child is taking their laptop to school that would assist with trying to develop good organisational habits.

LOCKERS


FILM EVENING

MORWELL TOWNSHIP BUS NETWORK - UPGRADE/CHANGES

Morwell Campus Students

Kurnai College has been working with Latrobe Valley Bus Lines and Public Transport Victoria to enable students at Morwell Campus improved transport options to get to and from school. We have now been able to arrange a bus that will pick up students that live in the area from McDonald Street to McMillan Street and over to Donald Street, Churchill Road area and drop them off at Morwell Campus on the Morwell 4 Bus. These students in the past have not had the opportunity of getting to school by bus.

Morwell Campus students wishing to use this service will be required to have a MYKI to access this bus as it is not a free bus unless you live over 4.8km from Morwell Campus. The cost each way is \$1.20.

MORWELL 4 - GREEN BUS CHANGES

The extension of the service known as MOR04 or Green Bus will now accommodate Morwell Campus students getting to and from school. These changes will now allow students to travel in the morning from the bottom of Comans Street up to McMillan Street, then down McMillan Street onto Kokoda Street, Churchill Road, Vary Street then Hourigan Road, The Boulevard, Airlie Bank Road, Bridle Road then onto the MOR04 Bus original Route via Chickerell Street, Garden Street, Gabo Way, Noonga Place, Wingan Way then will drop Morwell students at Morwell Campus, then Uni Campus students will continue down Bridle Road to University Campus. Morwell Campus students will be required to stay on the bus until the route in the new area of Bridle Estate is complete as student supervision at Morwell Campus commences at 8.00am.

In the afternoon the bus will come into Morwell via Tramway Road, Princes Drive, Nindoo Drive, Gabo Way, Wingan Way, Bridle Road, pick up Morwell Campus students, Laurel Street, The Avenue, and Hourigan Road up to the end of Vincent Road. Please refer the maps attached for more information.

University Campus/Churchill Campus students and Morwell Year 10 Students

University and Churchill Campus students are advised that this bus MOR04 (green bus) will no longer stop at Midvalley.

MORWELL 3 - BLUE BUS

The only bus that now stops at Midvalley is the MOR03 (blue bus) in the afternoon.

Eligible Students should be aware their bus pass only allows for a student to be allocated to one bus by the school. If you need to go to Midvalley after school you must now use your own MYKI if you want to change buses and travel on the MOR03 (blue bus).

Churchill Campus students are reminded that if they live in Morwell they are not attending their closest school so they will be required to use a MYKI card.



2019 YEAR 9 MORWELL CAMPUS STUDENTS LIVE IN MORWELL AND ATTEND MORWELL CAMPUS

All Year 9 students will be handed a (pink) Form 1 Application for Permission to Travel to University Campus from their teachers this week. The completed Form 1 allows students access to a free bus to University Campus for Headstart 2019 and 2020. Once the form is returned to the school we will process a Bus ID Card for student use on the days students attend the University Campus for their VCE subject.

If you do not get a Form by 31st October 2019 please see the General Office.

2019 YEAR 10 MORWELL CAMPUS STUDENTS LIVE IN MORWELL AND ATTEND MORWELL CAMPUS

All students eligible to claim Conveyance (a free bus) to get to school in 2020 who live in Morwell and will be attending University Campus, have pre-printed bus forms that need to be signed and returned to the school general office before Friday 8th November 2019. Two forms (mauve) Form 1 Application for Permission to Travel and (green) Form 3 Conveyance Application need to be completed. If students do not return these forms they will need to purchase a MYKI to access travel to and from Uni Campus during Headstart and 2020. No Forms-No Free bus.

2019 YEAR 10 CHURCHILL CAMPUS STUDENTS WHO LIVE MORWELL

Churchill Campus students who live in Morwell, who are eligible can claim Conveyance (a free bus) to get to school in 2020. Bus forms will be handed out to eligible Year 10 students this week. These forms once returned, allow us to create an ID card with a bus shown on it, to use for Headstart 2019 and 2020 instead of using a MYKI. If students do not return these forms, students will need to purchase a MYKI to access travel to and from Uni Campus during Headstart and 2020. Two forms (mauve) Form 1 Application for Permission to Travel and (green) Form 3 Conveyance Application need to be completed. No Forms-No Free bus.

VET/VCAL STUDENTS

Students from both Morwell and Churchill campuses who are undertaking a VET or VCAL course in 2020 which is off campus (not in Churchill) should complete a (green) Conveyance Application and indicate near the bottom of page 1 what course they are doing and where the course is. At the bottom of page 2 is an area for Parent/Guardian's banking information that needs to be completed. This allows the school to process a payment for approx. \$90 in Term 4 2020 to Parent/Guardians as a reimbursement of costs associated with VET or VCAL travel for 2020. To claim this students must live over 4.8km from the location of their VET or VCAL course.

IF NOT ATTENDING YOUR CLOSEST SCHOOL?

If a student is not attending their closest school, by family choice, they **are not** eligible for a free bus.
