Welcome back everyone,

By the time you read this I will be in China with some members of School Council celebrating the 20th anniversary of our sister school relationship with Kou'an in Taizhou. Many of our teachers and students have visited Kou'an and many from their school have visited us. Our International Program continues to grow and brings many rewards with it.

Next week Ross Fitzpatrick and a group of Year 9 students will travel to China for six weeks as part of the Victorian Young Leaders to China Program. In second semester another group from Year 9 will have the opportunity to head off to India in the Victorian Government's first ever Young Leaders to India trip. We are delighted to be part of this program which has delivered life changing benefits to our students.

Last year's Dux, Nathan Britt, benefitted from his trip to China and now has Mandarin as one of his university subjects. Matt Devonshire went on one of these trips and is now studying at a Chinese university in Shanghai. Another poignant example of the benefits of an international experience was brought to mind this week when I met with a student's carer at a behaviour and support meeting. The carer explained to me after the meeting that her son, who 7 or 8 years ago was on the brink of being excluded from our

College participated in one of these trips and had returned a changed kid. He subsequently was successful in gaining an apprenticeship and now is a tradesman in a job that he loves and is happy and settled in his life. She attributed the trip as a major cause of his change in attitude and outlook and she was so proud of the life that he has built and his bright future.



These are just a few examples of what has grown from our International Program. Today we deliver Mandarin to all of our feeder schools and I am confident that many more students will have similar growth experiences as our program rolls on.

We have begun the school year with a spring in our step and things have begun brightly as we move to deliver our new strategic plan. A main focus is improving attendance and I hope this issue becomes a significant blip on everyone's radar as we try to build attendance to 90%+ for every student. Let's all work together to get all of our students in class every day.
