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Message from our Campus Principal

Term 3



Hello everyone and welcome to Term 4. The better weather and discussions around what is on the horizon for next year always offers a sense of enthusiasm and potential.

The college has just undergone our school review where our new strategic plan will be put in place. As a leadership team, we are excited by the next four years and what we will do as a college to continue improving outcomes for our students.

Year 10 students have selected their subjects for Year 11 and whilst the thought of moving to another location can be a little daunting, my experience is that after a few hours at University Campus, students love the adult learning environment and soon forget their junior campus!

Students in other year levels will also be looking towards next year. Year 9 students will consider applying for the Year 10 Pathways Program at the University Campus, others will be looking to study a Year 11 VCE subject to enhance their studies in 2025 and others will be looking at consolidating their skills and knowledge in a Year 10 course.

Towards the end of last term, we started transitioning some of our Year 6 students into Year 7 for those students who need some extra time to become familiar and comfortable with the processes at secondary school. Our regular transition program of three days will return at the end of this year for all our Year 6 students moving into Year 7.



Police to visit us

2024 Year 8 Karoonda Park/Snowy River Camp

Next year during term one, Year 8 students will have the opportunity to attend a 5-day, 4-night camp at Karoonda Park near Gelantipy from Monday 26th February to Friday 1st March.

A cave tour at Buchan Caves will be included. We are making permission forms and payment plans available now to provide time for families to arrange payment.

Karoonda Park is based close to the Snowy River. Students will stay in group cabins and will take part in many activities such as abseiling, flying fox, horse riding, orienteering, swimming, and an overnight camp including rafting on the Snowy River. Tent accommodation will be provided for the camp-out night.

Students need to bring their lunch and a drink bottle for the first day. Breakfast, lunch and dinner are included each day. A what to bring/packing list will be provided closer to the camp date.

There will be an emphasis on building resilience and confidence, risk taking and team building activities throughout the camp, with students leading their groups through the range of activities provided. Students will have responsibilities during the camp, and they will work in collaboration with their teams to complete these tasks.

The total cost of the camp will be approximately \$725.00. Payment plans are available through the General Office. CSEF funding can be used for this camp. Families receiving Centrelink payments can apply for CSEF funding. Forms are available at the General Office. The Government Positive Start program is no longer running so this will be the only Year Level camp for 2024.

The Compass permission and payment forms, including the finalised price, will be available on Compass in the next week or so. Deposits and payment plans can be made through the General Office. Centre Pay is available to families receiving Centrelink payments and payments can be made through Compass.



 - Design, build, and test a prototype
- We used STELR Housing Kits, FLIR cameras and Minecraft EDU on iPads.

This gave us a chance to explore technology and we had hands on experiences that may one day help us become machinery operators, electricians, carpenters, architects, product testers, draftspersons, or engineers.



Hey everybody



Term 4 is here, and students have quickly gotten back into the swing of things. Students are busily learning new concepts in class in preparation for the CATs (common assessment tasks) that are fast approaching. The next round of LBUs will be released shortly and I am looking forward to celebrating the progress that each of our students are making in developing and refining their learning behaviours. While we are focusing on having a strong finish to the 2023 Year 9 program, our students are also beginning to look towards next year and the years beyond. There are a number of opportunities happening in Year 9, leading into students making choices for their Year 10 program next year, which I will outline below.

Morrisby testing and interviews

Students have been completing the online Morrisby testing over the past couple of weeks. This testing and questionnaire process will conclude with a report which families will be able to access online. Students will also be given a hard copy of the report prior to them attending their interviews. The test provides ideas for our students to explore possible future career pathways. To support the unpacking of their test, each student will have an interview with an external interviewer, either face to face or via online consult, where they will discuss what the results mean and how students can use this information as they move not just into Year 10 but also for years to come. Interviews will be held from Monday 30th Oct - Thursday 2nd Nov.

Year 10 information sessions

On Thursday 26th of October staff from the Kurnai University Campus will be coming to the Churchill campus and meet with Year 9 form groups to discuss a number of opportunities our students have to engage with the University Campus in 2024. Being situated so close to our University Campus allows our students access to various programs that may enhance their educational journey and it's important that our students attend these information sessions, so they make an informed choice about whether any of the programs offered will be suitable for their future pathways.

LBU acknowledgements

On Tuesday 24th of October students who received an LBU score above 3.5 were acknowledged with a build your own ice cream sundae stand. Students had the opportunity to enjoy a delicious treat and celebrate the effort they are demonstrating towards their learning. With the next round of LBUs fast approaching I can't wait to see the progress our students have made towards the goals they have set for themselves and hope to see a few more names added to the list to attend the next reward lunch.

disembarking and boarding a coach returning to the Morwell Campus. Students and staff had a great time, and the weather was just perfect...before returning to the cold of Victoria!




VET Orientation Day

Senior Campus HeadStart




Life and Death sculptures:

General Information

Information for Carers Regarding Assessment Exit Points

As part of our new Continuous Online Reporting, carers are now receiving information about “Exit Points”.

Most students in Years 7 – 10 undertake a Common Assessment Task (CAT) at the level expected at that time of year, for example, in Year 7, Semester 1, CATs are aimed at 6.5 on the Victorian Curriculum Standards. Some students will undertake a modified assessment that is appropriate to their current level.



Jewellery should be safe and discreet. Students may be asked to remove or use tape to cover jewellery during sport classes to prevent injury.


Make-up
