Homework Club

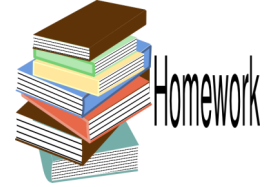

NAPLAN

The Year 7 team would like to congratulate the Year 7 students on their participation last week during the NAPLAN testing. Students showed a level of engagement and consideration towards each other that is acknowledged by all the staff at Kurnai as positive and encouraging. It can be a nervous and challenging time for students and their families and we are very proud of how well the cohort managed through this time.

Breakfast

During the week of NAPLAN testing it became evident that many of our students are coming to school without having eaten breakfast. It is important that students eat something substantial before beginning their classes as it significantly increases students' ability to concentrate, perform and learn in the classroom. Students who are not eating breakfast are having to wait until recess before they are able to eat again. This is concerning as it means students are losing two periods a day where they are potentially underperforming due to lack of nutrition and energy.

Awareness Day

Wednesday 30th May Years 7, 8 and 9 students will not be required to attend school as students from the local primary schools will be coming to Kurnai for their Awareness Day. Selected students from Year 7 will be invited to show case their leadership skills and will need to attend. If students wish to come to school, there will be an alternative program provided.

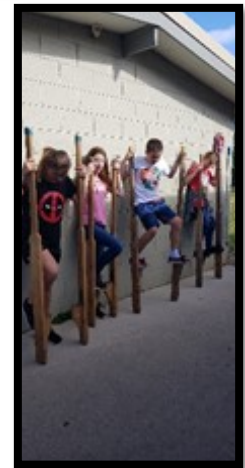
Camp Coolamatong

AGL Loy Yang Excursion

On the 18th April, we went to AGL Loy Yang and went inside the power station to find out more about what happens inside. We left at 9.00am and went to the mine first. Our tour guides told us the mine is 4km long and 200m deep. They told us if you took the MCG, turned it upside down and put it in the mine, it would fit perfectly. Then, we went to the actual power station. We saw the big chimneys and we were told they were 260m tall. That's bigger than the MCG! We went inside to this big machine which turns the coal into energy. It was so noisy we had to wear ear plugs!

Overall, during the excursion it really got me thinking about how much power we use in the Latrobe Valley. Since Hazelwood shut down, many shops and local businesses have closed because of the cost of power. I wonder how much money the Latrobe Valley spends on electricity each year, which would be a lot since Hazelwood closed. It was also cool to visit where my dad works, as I always wanted to go since I was younger and see what goes on 'behind the scenes'.

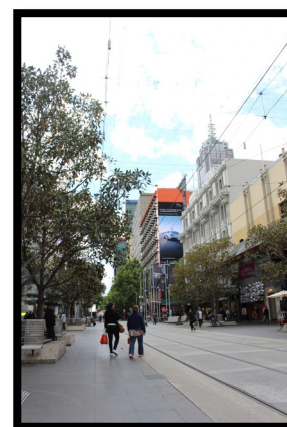

Short period Homestay families required

Kurnai College will be hosting two short term Chinese Study tours during term 3 this year as part of our International Program. We are looking for families who would be interested in hosting a Chinese student/s for up to a week.

While at Kurnai, the students will participate in a mix of English Language classes located at the University Campus and immersion classes at the Junior Campuses. These classes will be followed up by organised afternoon activities within the local area.

The Homestay is to provide a welcoming, nurturing and safe environment for young students, as it will likely be the first time these students have been out of China. If possible, it may pay to consider having two students billeted with your family making it less daunting and easier for both you and the students.

Hosting an international student is very rewarding and offers a wonderful opportunity to learn about a new culture and share our Australian way of life. This would be a great opportunity to consider for our students who are currently studying Mandarin or have/will be participating in our trips to China.

Host families are paid a nominal fee of \$30.00 per night per student, which is to assist with food, accommodation and transportation as required for students that are living with them.

Secondary School vaccinations in 2018

The Secondary School Vaccine Program offers free vaccines to Year 7 and 10 students. These vaccines provide protection against:

Diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis (whooping cough) – one dose for year 7 students

Human Papillomavirus (HPV) – two doses for year 7 students

Meningococcal A,C,W,Y – one dose for year 10 students

Parents/guardians of year 7 and 10 students should look out for the vaccine consent card booklet coming home from school with your child. You need to read the information, complete and return the card regardless of whether your child is being vaccinated at school.

The Latrobe City immunisation service may contact you about the Secondary School Vaccine Program. Schools are authorised to provide basic parent/guardian contact details to local councils for this purpose. Contact the school by 28 February 2018 if you do not want your contact details given to the Latrobe City immunisation service.

To learn more about the Secondary School Vaccine Program, the vaccines, the diseases they protect against, or how you can prepare your child for vaccination, go to betterhealth.vic.gov.au

Additionally, the Commonwealth government is funding vaccinations for all children under 20 years who missed scheduled vaccines. If students have missed vaccines, either in childhood or adolescence, and require catch-up vaccines, they should speak with their immunisation provider. (ie. local council or GP).
