complete which will be done over the next week or two. But we won't be seeing them again as a group until the Year 12 Graduation, to be held at the **Gippsland Performing Arts** Centre in Traralgon on the evening of Wednesday 15th November. Please put this date in your phone if you are the parent/carer of a Year 12 student, because we hope to see you all there.

The University Campus is now a little quieter after last Thursday's Celebration Day, with only our Years 11 and 10 students on campus. However, these students are facing a hectic few weeks. Year 11 students need to complete all course work for their current programs before the middle of week 7 with Year 11 VCE exams starting on Thursday 16th November and finishing for Year 11 students on Tuesday 21st November.

Year 11 students who are studying TAFE certificates on Wednesday or Friday may have already finished their course, but the finish dates vary between different providers and courses. The absolute final date for VET students studying on Wednesday will be 1st November and for students studying on Friday, 10th November. The Year 12 Melbourne Prep Camp, 22nd – 24th November, is open to all current Year 11 students, VCE or VCE/VM. 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Students from Kurnai College were among 120 students from across regional and rural Victoria to attend the Annual Biomedical Sciences Day at the University of Melbourne. Local students and their teacher Hamad Sabawi had the exciting opportunity to experience life as a biomedical scientist at the event presented by the University of Melbourne's School of Biomedical Sciences and the Gene Technology Access Centre (GTAC).

The University's Head of School of Biomedical Sciences, Professor Jennifer Wilkinson-Berka, encouraged the students to think about the science behind what creates, sustains and threatens people's lives in Australia and beyond.

Professor Wilkinson-Berka spoke of the



revolutionary work underway at the school, and the Gene Technology Access Centre including biological processes to better understand human health, computational biology, 3D printing to replace bones, genomics: new tools for cancer treatments, and new vaccines to combat disease.

Professor Wilkinson-Berka encouraged students to apply to the Bachelor of Biomedicine after completing their VCE studies. "When you come to Melbourne, you don't just come to the School of Biomedical Sciences," she said, "You have access to the whole of the Melbourne Biomedical Precinct, a collaboration of hospitals and research institutes that are right on our doorstep, not to mention the diverse range of career opportunities upon completion of your studies."



Students worked alongside researchers in the Gene Technology Access Centre Laboratories to photograph specimens using light, fluorescence and scanning electron microscopes, and had the opportunity to enter the images into their own Under the Microscope Coverslip Competition.

They also took a behind the scenes look at the University's Harry Brookes Allen Museum of Anatomy and Pathology and uncovered real tissue specimens and historical anatomical models, and a tour of the Digital Learning Hub which allowed students to experience how innovative digital technology is used to study the human body.

"The microscope activities were really cool" said student Jay. His teacher Hamad said the students really enjoyed the VR activity and found the Harry Brooks Anatomy Museum so

interesting".

University students Isabella Gilchrist, 1st year Bachelor of Biomedicine, Karam Matloob, 2nd year Bachelor of Biomedicine, and Ryan Shen, 3rd year Bachelor of Biomedicine, spoke about their courses, the diverse research topics they are pursuing and life on campus and in Melbourne.



The Kurnai College students also learned about Access Melbourne, a program that helps students from rural or regional areas gain entry to undergraduate courses at the university. Each year, 20 per cent of domestic undergraduate places are reserved for Access Melbourne applicants.
